# JUDGMENT **DECLARED**

# THIS WEEK'S **focus**

We all know that God knows what's best for us and that we should obey Him. However, sometimes we still do the wrong thing, even when we know what the right thing is. When we do whatever feels best to us at the moment instead of doing what God wants us to do, we end up hurting other people and offending God. As soon as we realize that we've done this, it's important to repent to apologize to God and the person we hurt, fix whatever we did wrong, and choose to act differently in the future. In today's session, we'll see that God's people weren't doing this. They were ignoring God and doing whatever they wanted, taking advantage of the poor and worshiping the false gods of other nations. Because they were disobeying God and ignoring His truth, He was going to judge them.

# SCripture AMOS 2:4-16

# AMOS 2:4-8

4 The LORD says: I will not relent from punishing Judah for three crimes, even four, because they have rejected the instruction of the LORD and have not kept his statutes. The lies that their ancestors followed have led them astray. 5 Therefore, I will send fire against Judah, and it will consume the citadels of Jerusalem. 6 The LORD says: I will not relent from punishing Israel for three crimes, even four, because they sell

a righteous person for silver and a needy person for a pair of sandals. 7 They trample the heads of the poor on the dust of the ground and obstruct the path of the needy. A man and his father have sexual relations with the same girl, profaning my holy name. 8 They stretch out beside every altar on garments taken as collateral, and in the house of their God they drink wine obtained through fines.

# AMOS 2:9-11

**9** Yet I destroyed the Amorite as Israel advanced; his height was like the cedars, and he was as sturdy as the oaks; I destroyed his fruit above and his roots beneath. **10** And I brought you from the land of Egypt and led you forty years in the

wilderness in order to possess the land of the Amorite. 11 I raised up some of your sons as prophets and some of your young men as Nazirites. Is this not the case, Israelites? This is the LORD's declaration.

# AMOS 2:12-16

12 But you made the Nazirites drink wine and commanded the prophets, "Do not prophesy." 13 Look, I am about to crush you in your place as a wagon crushes when full of grain. 14 Escape will fail the swift, the strong one will not maintain his strength, and the warrior will not save his

life. 15 The archer will not stand his ground, the one who is swift of foot will not save himself, and the one riding a horse will not save his life. 16 Even the most courageous of the warriors will flee naked on that day — this is the LORD's declaration.



# AMOS 2:4-16 CONVERSATION QUESTIONS

**READ AMOS 2:4-8.** 

Why was God planning to judge Judah and Israel? What were they doing wrong?

How did it affect God's reputation to the nations when His people disobeyed Him? What are some ways that we still affect God's reputation today?

**N** Which makes more sense to you, God's judgment of Israel's neighbors and enemies or God's judgment of Judah and Israel? Explain.



# **HISTORY**

The Israelites were showing utter disregard for their fellow human beings by selling people who couldn't pay back their debts into slavery. Those they didn't sell, they manipulated and mistreated for their own purposes. The law allowed Israelites to take the cloak of someone who borrowed money from them as collateral for a debt. However, they were supposed to give that cloak back at night so the debtor didn't freeze (see Ex. 22:25-27), and the Israelites weren't doing this. In addition, some Israelites were charging random fines that the poor couldn't contest and then collecting wine from them as payment. Then they got drunk on that wine in places of worship during festivals meant to honor God.

# **READ AMOS 2:9-11.**

Why did Israel and Judah forget about God's faithfulness? Was this a good excuse for their behavior?

How did God show grace to His people even when they were disobeying Him? How does God show grace to us today?

# READ AMOS 2:12-16.

Can we treat people badly and still truly worship God? Explain. Why do we sometimes think we can?

Why were God's people disrespecting the Nazirites and prophets? How do you think it felt to be treated this way? Have you ever felt this way?

How do we sometimes behave similarly to Judah and Israel of Amos's day?



Nazirites were people who took a vow to set themselves apart for God by abstaining from certain worldly things (see Num. 6:1-8). Anyone rich or poor, male or female-could become a Nazirite for a specified period of time, usually thirty days. Samson, Samuel, and John the Baptist were Nazirites for life. Likewise, anyone who puts their faith in Jesus for salvation becomes a Christian. God adopts us into His family and sets us apart for His own glory. He sends the Holy Spirit to live in us and help us live holy lives. The more intentionally we cooperate with the Holy Spirit, the more we stand out. Like the Nazirites, we proclaim God worthy of our worship and utter devotion.

# day 1

# AMOS 1:1-5

### **DWELL**

Amos began his prophecies by telling the Israelites about the judgments God was preparing to send against various Gentile nations. Because the Israelites knew they were God's people, they thought of themselves as superior to the nations around them. Not only that, but these nations frequently were at war with Israel. Amos's listeners were probably excited to hear that God was going to punish their enemies! However, they were about to learn that Amos had a difficult message for them, too.



What does the imagery Amos used in verse 2 teach us about God?



Why should we be slow to judge others who commit sins that we have also committed?

# **MEMORIZE**

Add reminders to your phone, computer, or calendar to read Amos 1:2 every morning and night this week.

### **PRAY**

Ask God to show you any areas where you are judging others rather than paying attention to your own sin and disobedience. Ask Him to forgive you.

# day 2

# AMOS 2:4-8

### **DWELL**

If Amos's listeners were excited to hear that God was planning to punish their neighbors, they were in for a rude awakening—they were going to be judged, as well. Just like their ancestors, the Israelites hadn't been following God's clear instructions to them. They were oppressing the poor to improve their own lives. They were also dishonoring God with sexual immorality. They were making a mockery of God and their covenant with Him, and soon they would experience the consequences of their disobedience.

Why do you think Amos prophesied against the Gentile nations first, and then prophesied against Israel? What was he trying to show his listeners?

Re-read verse 7a. What are some ways that you see people in need in your community being mistreated like this?
How should God's people act instead?

# **MEMORIZE**

Write Amos 1:2 on a sticky note and place it on your bathroom mirror. Read it to yourself each time you brush your teeth or wash your hands.

# **PRAY**

Pray that God would show you opportunities to pursue justice and compassion for those in need in your communities.

# day 3

# AMOS 2:9-11

### **DWELL**



What was God reminding the Israelites about in these verses? Why was He reminding them?



What is the connection between remembering, gratitude, and obedience?
How can you live these out in your own life?

In contrast to their stubborn and unjust disobedience, God reminded Israel of the ways He had cared for them and built up their nation. He had destroyed the Amorites so Israel could live in the land He had promised them. He had led them safely out of slavery in Egypt and through the wilderness. He had even honored many of them by calling them to serve Him. Yet, despite His loving care, they had still turned their backs on Him. Instead of thanking God for providing for them, they sought to provide for themselves, sinning against God as well as their fellow Israelites in the process.

# **MEMORIZE**

Pick a song you enjoy and read or sing Amos 1:2 aloud to the beat of that song. Read the verse this way throughout the week, trying to recite more of it from memory each time.


# **PRAY**

Thank God for His love, mercy, and faithfulness, and ask Him to show you people you can show that same love and mercy to this week.

# day 4

# AMOS 2:12-16

## **DWELL**



Why was the Israelites' treatment of the prophets and Nazirites such a big deal?
How do we sometimes act like this today?

Not only had the Israelites forgotten about God's love for them, but they showed further disrespect for Him by disrespecting the men and women He had chosen to serve Him. One of the vows Nazirites made was to abstain from drinking alcohol (see Num. 6:1-3). The job of a prophet was to prophesy. By making the Nazirites drink wine and telling the prophets to not prophesy, God's people were doing more than just ignoring Him—they were piling on the insults. In return, God was not going to hold back with His punishments.

### **MEMORIZE**

Write Amos 1:2 on the center of a sheet of paper, then add drawings or doodles around the edges that relate to the verse. Hang it somewhere you will see it every day.

### **PRAY**

Pray that He would give you ears to hear when He uses other people to speak to you, and ask Him to forgive you for any times you didn't listen because you didn't like what they had to say.

# day 5

# **ROMANS** 2:1-5

### **DWFLL**

If we judge others for sin, then we have no excuse for our own disobedience, because we have shown that we're aware of the commands we ourselves are supposed to be following. In fact, the very same sins we judge others for are often the very sins that we ourselves are guilty of! As Paul points out, God's judgment is based on His truth, not our own judgments about ourselves and others. So instead of pointing fingers at other people, we should examine our own lives and make sure that we are following God faithfully.



Re-read the devotion from day 1. How were the Israelites guilty of the kind of hypocrisy Paul warns against here?



How can we encourage one another when we are tempted to judge others for the way they are acting?

### **MEMORIZE**

Write each word of Amos 1:2 on a separate note card. Shuffle the cards and try to put them in the correct order. Do this throughout the week until you can do it from memory.

# **PRAY**

Thank God for the riches of His kindness and mercy. Thank Him that He is slow to anger and that His discipline is not cruel, but meant to lead us to repentance—to turn back to Him.
